It marks more than 35 years that Nova Scotia has given a 45 foot tree to the people of Boston as thanks for relief efforts following the December 6, 1917, explosion of a munitions ship in Halifax Harbor. Within 24 hours of the disaster a train loaded with supplies and emergency personnel was making its way from Boston to Nova Scotia.


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# Boston International Film Festival | beginning of June
