In Historic Roswell

Living in the Heart of Roswell

Money Magazine named Roswell “One of the Best Places to Live” in the United States in July 2010. Roswell was the only Georgia city to make the list and it was ranked number 24 on the list as one of the top-earning towns in the country with a median income of \$113,750.

Located just 20 minutes north of Atlanta on the northern banks of the Chattahoochee River, Roswell is rich in history and features antebellum architecture and historically significant buildings which illustrates the genteel and turbulent times seen by this community.

The historic significance of Roswell, along with a community commitment to restoration and retention of its natural beauty, are among the many reasons why this area is highly desirable place to live.

Rich in History

The Cherokees came to this site to trade and they called it “Enchanted Land”. Roswell is located just 20 miles north of Standing Peachtree, the Cherokee’s name for Atlanta. The Roswell area was part of the Cherokee Indians’ land. For all of the tribes’ attempts and progress to co-exist with the white man, the greed of gold found in North Georgia was greater. The land was acquired by the state of Georgia and the native Americans were removed and traveled on the infamous “Trail of Tears”.

Roswell King discovered the area’s potential during travels between his Georgia coastal home and the North Georgia mountains around 1828. From the beginning, King’s plan was for more than a common mill village; he envisioned a town similar to those in his native Connecticut with a school, churches, stores, town square workers’ dwellings and fine houses for his family and friends.

During the Civil War, the magnificent homes and church escaped destruction, Confederate soldiers burned the covered bridge at the Chattahoochee River to slow the advancing Union troops whom eventually occupied the town and

A wave of growth over the past 12 years has introduced a wide variety of art expressions, which has been a welcome addition to the Ann Jackson Gallery and the Peter Brandi Gallery on Canton Street that have anchored the art scene in Roswell for the past 30 years. With the input from the City’s Community Cultural Plan, the Roswell Visual Arts Center is leading the movement to build Roswell into a vibrant art community, both nurturing new artists, showcasing local artis and making the art accessible to patrons.

Walking Trails, Bicycling and More

Scenic nature trails are easily accessible. Enter the Old Mill Park at the Roswell Mill in the heart of Roswell. This covered entrance leads you across a covered bridge to the trail that connects Vickery Creek Falls to the Chattahoochee River. Azalea Park is located along the banks of the Chattahoochee River on Azalea Drive and offers a picnic area, covered pavilion, jogging and biking trails and the launch for rowing teams.

Roswell is considered a bicycle friendly community, with national bike races; a children’s bicycle safety rodeo; a Mayor’s Ride and a weekly 26 mile bike ride. Roswell was the first city in Georgia to be awarded a designation by the League of American Bicyclists as “Bicycle Friendly” as demonstrated by the Roswell commitment to all aspects of cycling.
